LIGHT AND DARK Squirrels and Rabbits
- Year 3



We have really enjoyed our first science topic in Year 3 which has been all about 'Light and Dark'. We have learnt about different sources of light, done an investigation into reflective materials and even designed ourselves a great pair of sunglasses to help protect us from the sun's rays. We have used our sunny afternoons to go out and explore the different sizes and shapes that our shadows have made at

different points of the day. We wrapped up our topic by visiting 'the blackout room' to test our hypotheses about whether or not we can truly see in the dark!

PE- Yoga:

This half term we have been developing our yoga skills and learning new yoga positions. In the first week, we learnt a sun salutation story, which showed how our poses can flow from one to the other. Then as the weeks went on, we learnt new positions and linked them together to create our own yoga stories. We even managed to learn some partner poses as well as individual ones!

BACK IN TIME...

What a fantastic start to this half term! We had lots of fun transporting ourselves back in time to the Anglo Saxon and Ancient Egyptian era. The children had a great time making their very own papyrus style paper out of brown paper bags, PVA glue and water. We explored how the Ancient Egyptians would have written using hieroglyphics. After studying the alphabet written in hieroglyphics, we wrote our very own coded message. Can you decode our message and discover what we have written? During our learning, we found out who the Saxons were, what life was like for them and where they invaded and settled. Within our English lessons, we have been learning how to recount an event. We learnt how to write an effective recount using paragraphs, expanded noun phrases and first person. Miss Allen and Mr Bissagar were extremely proud of our work. In addition, we have travelled back through times to the Anglo Saxon era and begun reading the story Beowulf. We have created our very own hero and written lots of description for hero auditions (to see which hero can defeat Grendel). We also used the 'power of three' to extend our sentences when building a picture of a setting in our writing.



WELCOME TO THE NEW BUILD



It is a shame that we have not been able to allow people in to our lovely new building to have a tour and enjoy the new setting. It is very special - bright, light, warm and welcoming. The children and staff have settled in very well, and everyone is just about used to where everything is now.

The building is performing very well, and we have plenty of room to create the bubbles we need to stay open and as safe as we can be. There is also plenty of space for small groups of children to move into other areas, so they can be assessed following the lock down, and then given the extra support,

if we identify a need. The field has been brilliant for playtimes and lunchtimes, again allowing the children to let off steam, whilst remaining in their bubbles. We have now closed the field for the time being, as it has been fed, and also needs to recover a bit from foot fall. Being a relatively newly laid field we just need to give it a chance for its first year. Even with closing it though we still have enough room on the games court, to have outside playtimes.

As we move through winter you will start to see the development of the grounds. We have plans to build an outside classroom near the wildlife pond and also start to turn that area into a Wellies and Waterproofs resource. The allotment has now been pencilled in for the very top of the site, near to where we want to establish our orchard.
