Good Lighting Award



On 8th December 2020 a new first-class lighting installation in Dorset received the BAA Commission for Dark Skies' Good Lighting Award. Certificates were presented to the recently completed Wimborne First School and to the Dorset Council Assets and Property Team who supplied the custommade scheme. Exterior lights at the school, on the northern edge of the town, were designed with the surrounding environment in mind. Sensors ensure that they come on only when needed. With a 'warm' colour temperature of 3000K and directed strictly onto the area to be lit, the car park lights and small, shielded building downlighters respect local biodiversity and the superb night skies of the newest International Dark Sky Reserve in Britain, the Cranborne Chase Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, the border of which is close to the school site. As you may have seen, we have started to develop some of the grounds now, in particular the Wellies and Waterproofs area. We have had our first teaching session up there, with Year 1 having story time accompanied by toasted marshmallows from the fire pit. The Centenary Plaque has been installed and looks great, and the Fernery has been planted behind it. Thanks to Simon Joyce of Jewson Poole for organising and paying for the removal from the old school and the installation up here. Also Thanks to Andy Mountford (builder) for his work on the project.

The composting toilet is now ready to install and reinstate, and we have started a small log pile to encourage biodiversity in the area. We have also planted a beautiful real Christmas Tree in the area, which will be celebrated for many years to come. Thanks for Mrs De La Haye for donating this to us, and Scott at Milton Roofing for transporting it and helping to transplant it.

Finally for now, the Outdoor Classroom has been installed which will allow us to increase the number of teaching sessions in the area, once we have fenced off the wildlife pond. We are looking for things to use in Mud Kitchens, so if you have any old pots and pans or kitchen utensils that you no longer want please think of us. We can recycle them, give them a new life, rather than them just being thrown out.

Community Centre, Gordon Road, Wimborne. They always welcome donations and items can be dropped in between 12pm and 2pm on Fridays. Thanks once again for your amazing generosity.
